

20-MINUTE HIV TEST NOW AVAILABLE

HIV Rapid Testing, a screening test that uses a simple oral swab or finger prick to give the results of a HIV test in approximately 20 minutes, is now available at Life Foundation. Individuals at risk for HIV are encouraged to get tested. Testing is free and confidential

Life Foundation has worked closely with the Hawaii State Department of Health to bring this important HIV prevention technique to the islands since its 2002 FDA approval.

Life Foundation has also been active in advocating for necessary changes in Hawai'i Administrative Rules. This rule change, entitled 'Clinical Laboratories and Laboratory Personnel,' changes regulations for organizations that perform health screenings such as HIV testing.

Other methods of HIV testing require a 1-2 week wait for results. Because of this delay, approximately 25 percent of the people Life Foundation test using older methods do not return to get

their results.

With an estimated one out of four HIV-positive individuals in the United States unaware of their status, new and faster HIV testing methods are critical to successful prevention efforts.

On June 27, 2007, Governor Linda Lingle signed the approval of a change in the Hawai'i Administrative Rules that allowed non-profit organizations like Life Foundation to perform Rapid HIV Testing.

Since this approval, Life Foundation has

finalized its training and prepared its staff to administer the test. During the month of September, Life Foundation ran a pilot program in its offices, offering the tests only to drop-in and regular clients.

As of September 28, 2007, Life Foundation opened the testing service to the public. Individuals

A MESSAGE FROM PAUL GROESBECK, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Aloha,

In the last issue of *LifeLines*, I talked about three things we hoped to have underway by the time the issue you are now reading was published. They were HIV Rapid Testing, a new Mental Health Services Division and more outreach to the people who do not reach out to us. I am happy to report significant progress in all of those areas.

On August 31, we began to offer the HIV test that returns a result in twenty minutes. In the first month, without any advertising, we had tested 100 people. Of these, three tests were reactive. Now that we have some experience, we are ready to tell the public about this important new test. In October, we will take to the roads and offer the test from our unmarked van in locations around the island. As always, HIV tests performed by Life Foundation are free and anonymous.

In July, we became a state-approved mental health provider for HIV-positive people. Since then, we have put together our

mental health team, passed our State Readiness Review and welcomed our first five clients.

Through this new program, we will be able to help people who are struggling with some form of mental illness gain more stability and, as a result, become more adherent to their lifesaving AIDS medications.

On July 10, we submitted an application to the federal Office of Minority Health for a care and prevention outreach program aimed at the Leeward area of O'ahu. We have long wanted to have a greater and more consistent presence there and now, with the recent notice that we have been awarded the grant, we will be able to do so. This effort will include testing in remote locations using the new rapid test, HIV prevention education, especially to youth-related programs, and locally



based, culturally appropriate case management for people in the area who are found to be HIV positive. We will also continue to combat the shame and stigma associated with HIV and AIDS.

In January, when the next issue of *LifeLines* arrives, I will wish you all a Happy New Year and tell you more about these and other activities at the Life Foundation. In the meantime, you can always reach me at 853-3234 or pgroesbeck@lifefoundation.org.

REACHING OUT TO THE LEEWARD COAST AND HOMELESS POPULATIONS

Life Foundation was recently awarded a three-year grant from the Office of Minority Health's Community Partnerships to Eliminate Health Disparities Demonstration Grant Program in the amount of \$250,000.

This grant will fund Life Foundation's work to address the specific needs of Native Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific Islander (NHAPI) communities at risk for HIV and/or HIV-positive on the island of O'ahu.

Through partnerships with the Waikiki Health Center and Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center, Life Foundation plans to target underserved populations on the Leeward Coast and the hidden homeless population throughout the island.

As stigma and shame around HIV/AIDS causes

health disparities in accessing HIV education, prevention, care, and treatment in Native Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific Islander communities, this proposed program seeks to build on established tools and interventions that have shown success in helping

HIV-positive Native Hawaiians, Asians, and Pacific Islanders.

In addition, this project plans to

utilize effective HIV prevention

interventions to reduce

risk and transmission of HIV within the Native Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific Islander communities in Hawai'i and link HIV-positive individuals to care services. In addition to linkages to modern western medical care, the community partnership proposes to conduct traditional native therapies, which are

widely utilized and requested in this community.

As many services generally do not target ethnic communities in Hawai'i, services may not necessarily be tailored to address cultural norms and traditions in Native Hawaiian, Asian, and Pacific Islander communities, leading to rising HIV and STD rates.

With this new grant, Life Foundation will significantly improve coordination and collaboration of organizations that work to confront the AIDS epidemic in Hawai'i through the community partnership with Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center and Care-a-Van of Waikiki Health Center.

This project will aim to achieve the ultimate unifying goal of ensuring that NHAPIs derive maximum benefit from strategies to prevent HIV/AIDS and access to the proven therapies to increase longevity and quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS.

LIFE FOUNDATION ADDRESSES HIV IN THE MARSHALL ISLANDS

15 YEARS OF SERVICE

This November marks the 15th anniversary of Life Foundation's executive director, Paul Groesbeck.

Over the past 15 years, Paul has overseen Life Foundation's evolution from a small, grassroots organization to one of the most respected and established AIDS organization in Hawai'i.

BENEFITS TRAINING

In August of 2007, five Life Foundation staff members attending a benefits training course to learn about the process of assisting clients to apply for federal and state benefits..

Life Foundation's attendance of the conference was made possible by a grant from the Office of Minority Health.

Life Foundation's Pacific Trainer, Peter Tuiolosega Silva, and Deputy Director, Xuan-Lan Doan, joined the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to the Republic of the Marshall Islands for a site visit to assess current HIV programs, provide technical assistance, and enhance collaboration efforts between our islands.

The Marshall Islands, about 2,100 miles to the west of Hawai'i, is where the team visited the Bureau of Public Health at Majuro Hospital. Life Foundation and the CDC were warmly greeted by HIV Program Coordinator, Mailyynn Konelios, and Dr. Zacharias Zacharias. Most HIV services are conducted at the hospital, which can be a barrier for many clients who wish to get tested or receive treatment for HIV.

A recent HIV surveillance project highlighted the advantages of collaborating with non-governmental organizations, similar to the relationship between Life Foundation and the Hawai'i State Health Department. CDC and Life Foundation were fortunate to meet with three such organizations who would like to assist the Ministry of Health in the fight against AIDS:

- **Youth to Youth** – a peer-based program that outreaches to disadvantaged (and often very high risk) youth in the islands,

- **Mission Pacific** – media specialists who produce beautiful and professional awareness materials in the Marshallese language,

- **WUTMI (Women United Together in the Marshall Islands)** – an organization dedicated to empowering Marshallese women.

The next stop on the site visit was Ebeye, the second most inhabited island. Bureau chief, Irene Paul, and her amazing staff at Ebeye hospital were extremely pleased with the visit. They shared their successes and challenges in working with the lives of those infected and affected by HIV and STDs. Their experiences and innovative efforts were astounding given the incredible lack of resources

allocated for their island.

Peter works in Life Foundation's Capacity Building Assistance (CBA) Department, along with Staci Hanashiro. CBA staff provide technical assistance to Health Departments and HIV-related community-based programs in Hawai'i and the six US-affiliated Pacific Island jurisdictions.

This visit to the Marshall Islands is part of a larger Pacific regional strategy to increase the capacity of health departments/ministries to implement HIV testing trainings, more effective community planning models, and the adaptation of evidence-based prevention interventions. Life Foundation is excited to increase the collaboration between our two islands.

PEER SUPPORT FOR HIV MEDICATION ADHERENCE

Using the appropriate medications on the timetable prescribed by physicians is critical to living with HIV. For newly diagnosed clients, or those with life factors such as mental illness or substance abuse problems, this adherence can be difficult.

To assist with this issue, Life Foundation is launching a new program that pairs clients who have a successful history with medications with those who have difficulties keeping the schedule. Officially entitled Peer-Based HIV Medication Adherence Program, the program nicknamed "Med Buddies" will begin later this year. Thank you to McInerny Foundation, G.N. The technique seeks to support incremental changes, even with those who are not willing or completely able to stop their

behavioral patterns.

The goals of this conference include sharing strategies of how to practice harm reduction in culturally appropriate ways in Hawai'i, and to increase networking abilities.

Conference topics include criminal justice, housing and homelessness, mental health, communicable diseases such as HIV, and working with youth.
